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## “Few Things”

It’s almost been seven months since I arrived in Afghanistan. Wow! I can hardly believe it. There have been so many times I wanted to quit and come home. That would be the easiest way out of this grueling work schedule and continuous frustration that I am experiencing, right? Yet none of those reasons are sufficient. I have to crucify my flesh, my wants, and my comfort to remain here. Many days I have wanted to give up, but Holy Spirit would convict (sometimes convince) me to hang on.

Although it has been a tremendous challenge to trust the Lord, I have learned a **few things**. I’ve learned that in all the years I prayed for Him to send me to the nations; He heard me. I remember sitting in my home year after year crying out to the Lord to send me. In my heart I knew it would happen; it just didn’t happen in the way or at the time I thought. Nevertheless my prayers were heard and held in my Father’s memory. This prayer request was the beginning of a **few things** being released in my life. However, before I could go anywhere, the Lord had to prepare me. During this preparation time, He was equipping and developing His character within me. The preparation was a testing of my faith. Father was watching to see how well I obeyed and handled the **few things**.

I know I can't stay here forever, so it will be interesting to see where God's next assignment takes me. In my spirit I sense another adventure planned and the suspense is increasing every day. The future is uncertain for me, but there is no doubt that the Lord is my strength.

If only I could see **everything** through His eyes and His wisdom, my **few things** would soon be **many things**.

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
